The current biggest issues is the Anglia Water works and road closure. Cllr Tolmie and Jane Seaney were interviewed by a BBC reporter about BBC looking at problems at Lords Walk. This is still available on line. Councillors were asked to phone Anglia Water if you spot seepage into concrete, as this may lead to a gush

### b. <u>Clerks report</u>

- a) Online banking: Lloyds have sent online details but these are in the name of Mildenhall High Town Council. Card and machine to be sent within two weeks.
- b) EPC Emergency Plan update: the clerk distributed example templates, and Cllr Tolmie agreed to work with the clerk to produce EPC Emergency Plan (give out example and ask for partner)
- c) B1112 Road closure: Clerk had asked Nigel Plumb for the times that traffic lights will be used. There have been several incidents where the public have moved bollards and forced their way through. This has led to a hardening of their position, and Nigel Plumb had written to the clerk:

"Unfortunately, due to the nature of the works and width of existing carriageway we are unable to facilitate the use of traffic lights for the duration of the scheme. All of our works must comply with Safety at Street Works and Road Works – Code of Practice 8815 Safety at Streetworks v1 12.indd (publishing.service.gov.uk)

Unfortunately we cannot meet the minimum lane width and safety Zone requirements to use traffic lights."

Water based bollards will be replaced by cement and CCTV. Car insurance will not be valid.

Update from Sqd. Ldr. Adam Eaton

RAF Lakenheath report to Eriswell Parish Council July 2024.

Operational Update.

- 1. The annual turnover of command positions is now complete. Of note:
- · Col Jack Arthaud assumed command of 48th Fighter Wing on 21 June vice Brigadier General Jo Campo.
- $\cdot$  Col Glen Cameron assumed command of the 48th Fighter Wing Mission Support Group on 12 July vice Col Shonry Webb.
- 2. Lakenheath Alliance for Peace established a Peace Camp outside the Main Gate between 15 and 25 Jul. The protest was largely peaceful with no disruption to 48FW's mission. Administration.
- 3. The closure of the B1112 due to works being carried out by Anglian Water is likely to increase traffic flow at peak times through Eriswell as vehicles that would otherwise approach from the South and enter via the Main Gate, have been advised to use Gate 2 as an alternative.
- 4. The USVF school summer holiday finishes on 19 Aug. There will be an increase in traffic at peak times, compounded by the road closure

The peace camp was well policed; any sign of issues were controlled immediately. There were two arrests.

Apologies, having said that the cameras were nothing to do with us at a previous meeting. I subsequently found out that the cameras had been installed by the Defence Infrastructure Organisation.

A resident is concerned about the condition of air brought about by the planes.

A blockage of the A1065 would cause real problems Sometimes there is a huge back log, it can take 20 minutes to get on Base.

**Dear Sirs** 

I write as I am preparing a Woodland Management Plan for the Elveden Estate, covering the management of its woodlands over the coming ten years. As many of the woods lie within Eriswell parish, and are adjacent to public rights of way which will be used by your fellow parishioners, I would like to seek the Parish Council's feedback on the management proposals below. In deciding what to do, I have weighed up what needs doing to maintain the current trees, but also to make sure that the woodlands are fit for a future climate with warmer, wetter winters and hotter, drier summers.

The work areas within Eriswell parish are shown on the attached map, and proposals are as follows:

- 1. Maintain thinning on woods which are still growing strongly, increasing space for the stronger trees and light to the understorey.
- 2. Where woods are over-mature and beginning to decline, fell up to 20% of these areas in the next ten years and replant with a mix of species well-matched to the site and fit for the predicted future climate.
- 3. Where shelterbelts are incomplete or contain only one age of trees, supplement with additional planting to extend their life expectancy for the protection of soil.

I would be grateful if you could discuss this with the Council and let me know of any particular sensitivities on these sites, and we can then look at how the Plan might contribute to this. If there are any queries please don't hesitate to contact me.




### Appendix D

On 08 May 2024 at 18:00 the SID was installed on the B1112 on the pole positioned opposite the Volvo dealership, The Street, in the village of Eriswell. The SID was positioned to monitor traffic


coming from the direction Lakenheath heading South towards Eriswell Village. Traffic speed and volumes were measured from 00:00AM 29th June up until 23:59PM on 30 th July 2024. There are between 2800 and 3000 weekdays passing this point. There are between 2100 and 2400 vehicles per day over the weekend heading towards the village. The busiest times during the week are 07:30-08:30 (Avg. 230 cars p/h) and 15:30-17:30 (Avg. 290 cars p/h). The 85th Percentile Speed (most people) travel at or below 34.8 MPH past his point. The 50th Percentile Speed (half the traffic) travel at or below 28.8 MPH past his point. The fastest speed recorded during this period was 70MPH (x1) and 65MPH (x3). The SID is positioned 670m past where the 30MPH zone starts (460m past the T-junction). The next pages show: - Speed vs vehicle counts at the point listed above. - Typical hourly volumes (weekdays) passing this point - Community Speed Watch Team Limit (35MPH) exceedances table - SID Location aerial diagram
